From the Principal

Hello, and hope that we are all starting to be rid of the flu virus, in its many forms, that has engulfed our school. It has been a horrendous winter; we have had so many students and staff really struggling with their health. Please can you remind your children to use tissues and wash hands - we do but think we all need to be repeating this mantra.

Last week, students in years 3 and 5 brought home their NAPLAN results to their parents. I am going to summarise for you the results. Overall, in many areas we are at or above the national average, which is extremely pleasing particularly as in the areas we have focused on as a school, we are seeing fantastic results. Interestingly for year 5, we were above the ACT benchmarks.

YEAR 3- 38 students, not all of these 38 students have attended our school since Kindergarten. Band 4 is the average achievement for 2015 from an Australian percentage. Because we are a small school, each student represents approximately 4% of the total score. The overall picture is that for Reading, grammar and punctuation and numeracy we were above the national average, slightly below in writing and spelling but still within the range of achievement for 60% of Australian children.

2014- 38 students

2013 – 32 students

Please be mindful that these statistics relate to all Evatt students in years three and five inclusive of disability and EALD.

Reading

Using the 2013, 2014 and 2015 results we now have 41.00% of our students in the top band, band 6 for reading. The NSW/ ACT average at this level is 36.8%. This has fluctuated, but in analysis this has gone from 35.5 % in 2013, 23.7% in 2014 and 41.0 % this year. This means that more students are achieving within the top band for this year level than in the past. This also correlates with the difference in cohorts. Interestingly in 2013, we had 25.8 % of our students achieving level 5 whereas now we only have 10.3- so the move is upwards. So, in summary 66.7 % of our year 3 students are at or above benchmark using the comparative results for this year's cohort- the agreed national rating for average or above. Last year, we had 66.2% of our students at or above benchmark. The NSW and ACT, average for reading in 2015 is 75.4%.

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Writing

The story for writing is that in the last three years we have continued to build our student's capacity to be at national benchmarks. This year 24 of our students were at or above national benchmark, 63.1% In 2013, it was 56.25 % and last year it was 71.05%. This is below the ACT benchmark but we are improving, and it does take more time to improve writing standards than reading. Interestingly, for the last two years we have had the same number of students in the top two bands- 24 students in band 5 and 6. The national average for writing in 2015 is 63.7% and we scored 52.7%.

Spelling

Since 2013, we have achieved 87.5%, 79.0% and 73.8% this year in spelling which is why we have had a focus on spelling this year. I would expect to see more students achieving at or above benchmark in future years as the intensive work we have undertaken, improves student's ability to understand how words are constructed. The national average for spelling in 2015 is 63.7% and we scored 52.7%.

Grammar and punctuation

This year 87.4 % of our students are at or above benchmark. In 2013, 87.6% of our students were at or above; 97.4% of students in 2014 were at or above benchmark.

Numeracy

This year 68.5 % of our students are at or above benchmark. In 2013, 90.6% of our students were at or above; 84.2 % of students in 2014 were at or above benchmark. The average percentage for .

YEAR 5 – 29 students, not all of these 29 students have attended our school since Kindergarten.

As you can see, we continue to grow and improve. Even where we didn't reach the state mean, we are close to the mark and students have continued to increase their scores.

A huge thank you to our fabulous staff who all work towards increasing student attainment – they do a fabulous job and work very hard to improve learning outcomes for your children.

Uniform Colour Code

Finally this week, I do appreciate that this has been a cold winter, but more and more students are not wearing colour code to school. Tops for inside should be navy- I understand that warm coats are a variety of colours and I don't expect them to be navy, but far too many students are not wearing colour code... the policy is on our website and endorsed by the School's governing body. More than 20 students in year 1/ 2 had to borrow a blue top yesterday for an excursion. Could we please ensure that fleecy tops are blue? Thank you.

BASKETBALL



P&C – Concerns Regarding Traffic

Dear Evatt Families

In a recent P & C meeting a number of parents raised their increasing concern for the safety of our children at school pick up and drop off times. Over the past few months we continue to see unsafe incidents in the carpark and roads adjacent to the school at pick up and drop off time. Unfortunately a number of parents and carers blatantly disregard the safety measures set up by the school and on a number of occasions we have observed 'near misses' – where a child has very nearly been hurt. We appeal to ALL people in and around the school at pick up and drop off times to please adhere to the guidelines in place before a child is hurt.

As parents of the school, we expect that our children are safe not only whilst they are at school, but also as they enter and exit the school grounds before and after school. We are very appreciative of the extensive measures the school has put in place to provide safe drop off and pick up areas for our children, but are constantly frustrated, and to be honest angered to see parents and carers disregard the safety measures put in place. Despite constant requests to the contrary in newsletters and letters home to the families, we have seen the following incidents occur over the last few months:

- Cars entering the carpark to drop off/pick up their children. Often times they will double park, limiting access to the school for staff. By parking/waiting in the school carpark they are encouraging children to walk through the carpark rather than via the access paths around the carpark which is dangerous for the children and difficult for staff who may be trying to reverse out of a carpark.
- Cars parking in the disabled carpark. These provide access issues for the families who can legitimately park here and it is frustrating and difficult for them to have to source another carpark.
- Cars turning right out of the school carpark despite the signage asking them to do otherwise and the fact that there is a pedestrian crossing for children here. It is very hard for children to negotiate the crossing when they have to look left, right and behind them.
- Cars who, despite the fact that should not be in the carpark, do not give way to children walking or riding across the entry and exit of the carpark. On several occasions we have witnessed near collisions with a child.
- Cars that cross the white line on Heydon Crescent to do a 'u turn' during peak traffic periods rather than drive around the block. This is dangerous for everyone concerned.
- Cars that misuse the 'kiss and drop/collect' zone outside the school.

These issues become all the more serious in light of the recent incident of a child being hit by a car at a pedestrian crossing at a local school. This unfortunate incident has prompted us to write and ask families to please respect the traffic arrangements put in place for the safety of our children. How would you feel if it is your child that is injured?
