## **From the Principal**

Welcome back! Term 2 has swung into action. The students are really calm, settled and well and truly back in to their learning regimes.

This is a busy term for students and staff. Reports are being prepared ready to be given to you in the penultimate week of the semester. Teachers use the Australian Curriculum Achievement Standards to inform their decisions. They use the exemplars provided by ACARA (Australian Curriculum and Reporting Authority) to moderate your child's grading. All teams moderate student work to ensure consistency.

So if your child receives a "C" you can be confident that your child is achieving at the expected national standard. Sometimes parents are discouraged by this grading, but it is a good thing because you are reassured that your child is working to the expected standard for all students across Australia. If your child receives an A or B it means that they are performing above the expected standard and if they receive a D or E it means they are not at the expected level for their age appropriate level. Interviews will be held as usual in week 10. The interview booking schedule will be on line and will be open later in the term.

Every week, the Learning and Support team host a meeting where each teacher in rota, have an opportunity to discuss each of the students in their class. This meeting provides an opportunity for teachers to flag their concerns and as that concern is shared, actions can be enacted to further support students.

### **NAPLAN**

NAPLAN starts in week 3- students will complete the tests mostly on line. All tests, bar writing for year 3 will be completed on line. We are organised and have checked devices to ensure that all is ready to go. Just a reminder, that if your child is in years 3 or 5, then you can still withdraw them from the test up until the morning of the first test. This is available to all students, but particularly those students who suffer anxiety.

## TEACHERS WORKING HOURS

I read an article in the Sydney Morning Herald this week about a commentary on teachers working longer hours and have fewer holidays. Anyone who lives with a teacher or who is a teacher knows that on average teachers work more than 50 hours per week. Primary teachers have 21.5 hours of face to face teaching per week; they are paid for a 36.75 hour week, and most teachers work much longer than that. Many of our staff were in school anyway over the stand-down (which was difficult because we had no power) but a lot of work can and is done electronically at home.



# PREPARING CHILDREN FOR WHAT'S AHEAD

Evatt School is committed to using technology and facilitating digital learning opportunities for our students, which are safe and secure. At Evatt, students and teachers from 3-6 are using Google Apps for Education (GAFE) to practise their communication and information gathering skills within a secure environment.



## GOOGLE APPS FOR EDUCATION (GAFE)

GAFE is a cloud based system offering online productivity tools for classroom collaboration. GAFE provides students and teachers with unlimited cloud storage in Google Drive, Docs, Sheets, Slides and Drawings. GAFE also provides an online classroom platform for teachers to communicate with students and set collaborative tasks.



## WHAT'S HAPPENING NOW?

In the 5/6 classrooms students are focused on word processing skills in order to write, edit and publish quality work. They are being taught and challenged to identify quality sources of information and develop appropriate research skills.



The 3/4 students are continuing to learn the basics of computer usage with a focus on being safe online and using the Chromebook as a tool for learning.



The Climatologists are focusing on logging-on, searching safely to finding images and typing. The Mineralogists are learning how to research for their passion projects and are using the *Read and Write* tool to voice type their ideas.

## SAFE PRACTICE ONLINE

At the forefront of our minds whilst teaching in an online environment is to ensure that our students have the skills and knowledge to stay safe online. Some key concepts we cover include:



# The Biology of Plastics

“One word; Just one word, are you listening? The future is *plastics*.” So goes the famous quote (*The Graduate*, 1967). In '67 the future was plastic. Today plastics are everywhere around us. I mean *everywhere*. Everything is sealed, packaged, or encased in a plastic of some variety. Even our takeaway coffee cups have a plastic lining, in order to prevent leakage. Single use syringes, single serve sandwiches, shopping bags and space flight all owe their existence to sterile, stretchable, mouldable plastics. They are designed to be used once and thrown away. BUT: Have you ever asked yourself what happens once the plastic hits the garbage?

Most plastic becomes landfill as it is a non-redeemable resource. Even the so called ‘compostable’ cutlery is not actually compostable. Sure, they ‘degrade’ into smaller particles, but do they actually contain any substances that actually decompose into a food source for microbes, fungi, or plants? Not ... likely. I think about this every time I dispose of my rubbish: how much of it is actually recyclable?

Due to a lot of home landscaping projects and one craft-crazy five-year-old, very little cardboard actually makes it into the bin in our house. It is used to ‘sheet mulch’ the weeds, balance the carbon content of the compost, or is lost in a mess of sticky-tape and paint.

Metal items of suitable size have always been prized by scrapyards. Metals are easy to bend, break, weld, melt, and mould into new forms. The components are easily reclaimed. Glass, to a lesser extent, can also be melted down and re-used. Pyrex and laboratory glassware have been specially treated to resist heating or chemical attack. This makes them unsuitable for recycling, but the inert nature of glass makes it a great substitute for artificial stones, and sand filters. It behaves like rock when eroded by wind and water, and indeed, there are beaches made almost entirely of glass ‘stones’. If crushed, it can mimic sand, which is a primary component of glass. Sand is not easy to digest, and does not mimic any common food source. Hence, fish are unlikely to ingest toxic amounts of sand. Rather, it is spat out once food particles have been removed. If glass goes to landfill it doesn’t do a lot except take up space and weight, unlike plastic.

There are few places in my house where I can suitably re-purpose plastic containers and wrappings. There are only so many mini plastic greenhouses I can build from old fruit containers. The more concerning problem with plastics is the way in which they degrade. Degradable plastic objects breakdown into smaller and smaller particles until they become what are known as ‘microplastics.’ Microplastics are minute plastic particles which can be transported by ground runoff or rain, and end up in reservoirs, harbours and other water storage areas. It can also settle in soil or other agricultural land. They are transported through the food chain when ingested by livestock and wildlife. The whole system is poisoned just as if you had used a cheese grater to scrape an empty water bottle into a feed trough. Unlike the glass, microplastics are toxic as they are swallowed and interfere with biochemical processes.

As a result, plastic is not compostable, regardless of what the take away chains tell you. Only things that had once been living and are now dead, are truly compostable. So wooden cutlery, paper plates and chicken carcasses are all compostable. Plastic forks and coffee cups are not. Plastic will be this generation’s legacy to the next. Just like cancer from smoking and lead paint was left to us from the baby-boomers. Plastic pollution is everywhere – even in the middle of the Pacific Ocean. 75% of rubbish on Australian beaches is from plastic containers (Tangaroa Blue Foundation, 2018). So what is to be done? Education, as always, holds the key.

Kids aren’t stupid. Mine teach me that every day. They are also information sponges: they see all, they hear all. This generation are more informed than any before them. They know about the environment and how it has been changed by human behaviour. They know that seagulls are strangled by plastic tags and that turtles choke and drown on plastic bags. Studies show that what’s taught and accepted in the home will be incorporated into adult behaviours. This is how culture develops. So if we can create a culture of reduced plastic use, then perhaps we can repair the mistakes of the past and create a ‘greener’ future. It all starts at home.

I am interested to hear what others think, and, more importantly, if you have any ideas for how Evatt could reduce its use of plastic? I’m sure the Board are more than willing to hear any reasonable and economically feasible ideas. The Eagle is an ideal sounding board for ideas and don’t forget the school and P&C also have their own Facebook sites. (ZE)
